CARPENTER / JOINER FOUNDATION PROGRAM







Students enrolled in the 30-week (900 hours) Carpenter and Joiner Foundation Program will learn the skills required to seek employment in the trades of carpentry and joinery. They will develop the skills needed to begin working as carpentry or joinery apprentices. Graduates of this program will receive credit for Level 1 Apprenticeship technical training for both Carpentry and Joinery and may also be granted practical credit from the Industry Training authority (ITA). On successful registration and sponsorship into an apprenticeship program, the ITA will request that graduates choose which apprenticeship pathway they intend to pursue.

Career Opportunities

Carpenters work for construction and renovation companies and in the maintenance departments of buildings and factories. Some even start their own businesses. For more information on Carpenter employment opportunities:

Credentials Received

Upon successful completion, the graduate will receive Level 1 Apprenticeship technical training for both Carpentry and Joinery and may also be granted practical credit from SkilledTrades BC. Secondary school students will earn 32 elective credits (8 Grade 12 courses) towards graduation.

Physical Requirements

- Activities require lifting and carrying tools, supplies and equipment weighing up to 25 kg
- Lift, carry, hold and operate hand, air and power tools from below grade to above shoulders
- Stand on concrete and asphalt, dirt, rock, wood, etc. for extended periods of time.
- Bend, stoop, kneel, crawl to perform tasks
- Learn and work in all weather conditions including prolonged periods of rain or heat
- Push/pull and carry lumber and construction materials
- Climb extension ladders, and work on scaffolding at heights

Recommendations for Success

- Good general health and respiratory condition
- Capable of doing physical work
- Physical strength and stamina compatible with the handling of heavy equipment and materials
- Ability to tolerate loud noise and vibration from riveting tools
- · Good manual dexterity
- Balance and coordination to walk on uneven ground for up to 8 hours per day
- Good hand-eye coordination
- Satisfactory eyesight, line, form and depth perception

Sponsorship Requirements for SD23 Students

- Attend "Student for a Day"
- Complete the School District application package and hand it into your Career Programs Coordinator
- Be on track to graduate with a Dogwood diploma
- Meet with Career Coordinator to review program and school district exemptions
- Okanagan College course requirements / admission requirements met for program - see OC website for full details
- Application approved and accepted by School District
- An interview may be required for potential applicants
